The Practice

The three-year average cost for power at the Wilkie Saskcan Community Centre was \$68,730 per year to run the whole facility including to power the Ice Plant during the winter months. This is for only one building for operating costs; ao Town Council saw the potential to reduce the costs at the Wilkie Saskcan Community Centre by wanting to install the solar panels to the roof of the community center.

Within 5 1/to 6 1/2 years the Town of Wilkie will start to see annual savings of \$15,000 to \$18,000 per year in its operating costs and will also take that long to recover the money that the Town of Wilkie has put into this project.

We heard that the Town of Biggar, Sask had taken on a solar panel project in their town and so we did some investigating and found out that the company that installed them was more than qualified to do the job. This was intriguing to Wilkie Town Council. We then decided that this was the project we would like to add to our town and put out a Tender to see who would be the perfect contractor for the job. Prairie Solar Sun won the bid to do the work on the Wilkie Saskcan Community Center and work commenced at the start of the summer of 2021 and was finished by Fall of 2021.
